What is OPDIVO?

OPDIVO is a prescription medicine used in combination with chemotherapy that contains fluoropyrimidine and platinum to treat adults who have **cancer of the tube that connects the throat to the stomach (esophageal cancer)** and their cancer:

- ✓ Is a type called squamous cell carcinoma, AND
- ✓ Cannot be removed with surgery (advanced), or
- Has spread to other parts of the body (metastatic) **and** you have not already had treatment for your advanced or metastatic esophageal cancer.

It is not known if OPDIVO is safe and effective in children younger than 18 years of age.



OPDIVO can cause your immune system to attack normal organs and tissues in any area of your body and can affect the way they work. Some of these problems may happen more often when OPDIVO is used in combination with another therapy.

What are the serious side effects of OPDIVO® (nivolumab)?

A **serious side effect** is a side effect that can sometimes become severe or life-threatening and can lead to death. They may happen anytime during treatment or even after your treatment has ended. You may have more than one of these problems at the same time.

Call or see your healthcare provider right away if you develop any new or worse signs or symptoms, including:

- lung problems
- intestinal problems
- liver problems
- · hormone gland problems
- kidney problems skin problems
- severe infusion reactions
- complications of bone marrow (stem cell) transplant that uses donor stem cells (allogeneic)

What are the most common side effects?

The most common side effects of OPDIVO when used alone include:

- feeling tired
- rash
- pain in muscles, bones, and joints
- itchy skin
- diarrhea
- nausea
- weakness
- vomiting

- constipation
- decreased appetite
- back pain
- upper respiratory tract infection
- fever headache
- stomach-area
- (abdominal) pain
- urinary tract infection

The most common side effects of OPDIVO when used in combination with fluoropyrimidine and platinum-containing chemotherapy include:

- feeling tired
- tingling, or burning constipation mouth sores

OPDIVO + chemotherapy* is FDA-approved for previously untreated adults with advanced or metastatic **esophageal squamous** cell cancer, regardless of PD-L1[†] biomarker status





WHAT'S A BIOMARKER?

A **PD-L1 biomarker** is a molecule found in the body in tissues, blood, or fluid. Biomarkers may show if there is a disease or condition present. Your doctor may test you to see if you have the PD-L1 biomarker.


A LOOK AT THE OPDIVO + CHEMOTHERAPY* STUDY

Part of a larger clinical trial, the study included 645 patients, regardless of their PD-I 1 hiomarker status.

All had previously untreated advanced or metastatic esophageal squamous cell cancer.

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




More people were alive on OPDIVO + chemotherapy* compared to chemotherapy* alone



In a study of 645 adults with previously untreated advanced or metastatic esophageal squamous cell cancer, 321 received OPDIVO in combination with chemotherapy* and 324 received chemotherapy* alone. Of these, 315 adults had PD-L1 ≥1%. In this group, 158 adults received OPDIVO in combination with chemotherapy* while 157 adults received chemotherapy* alone.





Adults with PD-L1 ≥1%

For adults with a PD-L1 biomarker ≥1%, half of the aduls on **OPDIVO + chemotherapy*** went 6.9 months without their cancer spreading, growing, or getting worse compared to half who went 4.4 months without their cancer spreading, growing, or getting worse on chemotherapy* alone.

OPDIVO + chemotherapy* reduced the risk of cancer spreading, growing, or getting worse by 35% compared to **chemotherapy*** alone.

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


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More people had their tumors shrink or disappear on OPDIVO + chemotherapy* regardless of PD-L1 status



In a study of 645 adults with previously untreated advanced or metastatic esophageal squamous cell cancer, 321 received OPDIVO in combination with chemotherapy* and 324 received chemotherapy* alone. More of the OPDIVO + chemotherapy* adults had their tumors shrink or disappear compared to the adults on chemotherapy* alone.

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

OPDIVO Helps Seek and Attack: How it works with your immune system



OPDIVO can cause your T cells to attack healthy cells contained within organs and tissues in any area of your body and can affect the way they work. These problems can sometimes become serious or life-threatening and can lead to death, and may happen anytime during treatment or even after treatment has ended. You may have more than one of these problems at the same time. Your doctor will check you for these problems during treatment. Your doctor may treat you with corticosteroid or hormone replacement medicines. Your healthcare provider may also need to delay or completely stop treatment if you have severe side effects. Please see pages 9–10 for a list of possible side effects and what to look out for.

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
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

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OPDIVO is given through intravenous (IV) infusion. The medicine is given directly into the bloodstream through a needle placed in a vein by a healthcare professional—usually in the arm or hand. Chemotherapy may be given on the same day.



Talk to your doctor about which treatment schedule may be right for you. These are the recommendations about treatment, timing, and dosing. Your doctor will decide how many treatments you need. Your healthcare provider will do blood tests to check you for side effects, and may treat you with corticosteroid or hormone replacement medicines, and delay or completely stop treatment if you have side effects that are severe. Be sure to talk to your healthcare team about side effects.

Frequent communication with your healthcare team is an important part of treatment. Use your appointments to let them know how you're feeling and ask any questions you may have.

If you miss an appointment, call a healthcare provider right away. Try to schedule your appointments for the same day of the week and the same time of day to make them easier to remember. It is important for you to keep all appointments with your healthcare provider.

Important Facts About OPDIVO® (nivolumab)

This is a summary of important information that you need to know about OPDIVO. Your healthcare team can work with you to help answer any questions you may have about OPDIVO. Keep this information in a safe place so you can refer to it before and during your treatment.

What is OPDIVO?

OPDIVO is a prescription medicine used in combination with chemotherapy that contains fluoropyrimidine and platinum to treat adults who have cancer of the tube that connects the throat to the stomach (esophageal cancer) and their cancer:

What is the most important information I should know about OPDIVO?

OPDIVO is a medicine that may treat certain cancers by working with your immune system. OPDIVO can cause your immune system to attack normal organs and tissues in any area of your body and can affect the way they work. Some of these problems may happen more often when OPDIVO is used in combination with another therapy.



Get medical help immediately if you develop any of these signs or symptoms or they get worse. It may keep these problems from becoming more serious. Your healthcare team will check you for these problems during treatment and may treat you with corticosteroid or hormone replacement medicines. If you have severe side effects, your healthcare team may also need to delay or completely stop your treatment.

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A **serious side effect** is a side effect that can sometimes become severe or life-threatening and can lead to death. They may happen anytime during treatment or even after your treatment has ended. You may have more than one of these problems at the same time.

Call or see your healthcare provider right away if you develop any new or worse signs or symptoms, including:

Lung problems – Things to look out for may include:

- new or worsening cough
- · shortness of breath
- chest pain

Intestinal problems – Things to look out for may include:

- diarrhea (loose stools) or more frequent bowel movements than usual
- stools that are black. tarry, sticky, or have blood or mucus
- severe stomach-area (abdominal) pain or tenderness

Liver problems – Things to look out for may include:

- vellowing of your skin or the whites of your eyes
- severe nausea or vomiting
- pain on the right side of your stomach area (abdomen)
- dark urine (tea colored)
- bleeding or bruising more easily than normal

Hormone gland problems - Things to look out for may include:

- headaches that will not go away or unusual headaches
- eye sensitivity to light
- eve problems
- rapid heartbeat
- increased sweating
- extreme tiredness

- · weight gain or weight loss
- feeling more hungry or thirsty than usual
- urinating more often than usual
- hair loss
- feeling cold

- constipation
- your voice gets deeper
- dizziness or fainting
- changes in mood or behavior, such as decreased sex drive. irritability, or forgetfulness

Kidney problems – Things to look out for may include:

- decrease in your amount of urine
- blood in your urine
- swelling of your ankles
- loss of appetite

Skin problems – Things to look out for may include:

- rash
- itching

- skin blistering or peeling
- · painful sores or ulcers in the mouth or nose, throat. or genital area

Problems can also happen in other organs and tissues. These are not all the signs and symptoms of immune system problems that can happen with OPDIVO. Call or see your healthcare provider right away for any new or worsening signs or symptoms, which may include:

- Chest pain, irregular heartbeat, shortness of breath, swelling of ankles
- Confusion, sleepiness, memory problems, changes in mood or behavior, stiff
- neck, balance problems, tingling or numbness of the arms or legs
- Double vision, blurry vision, Low red blood cells. sensitivity to light, eye pain, changes in evesight
- Persistent or severe muscle pain or weakness. muscle cramps
 - bruising

What are the possible side effects of OPDIVO?

OPDIVO can cause serious side effects, including:

Severe infusion reactions – Things to look out for may include:

- chills or shaking • itching or rash
- shortness of breath or wheezing dizziness
- feel like passing out
- back or neck pain

Tell your healthcare team right away if you get these symptoms during an infusion of OPDIVO.

Complications of bone marrow (stem cell) transplant that uses donor stem cells (allogeneic). These complications can be severe and can lead to death. These complications may happen if you underwent transplantation either before or after being treated with OPDIVO. Your healthcare provider will monitor you for these complications.

What are the most common side effects of OPDIVO?

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- pain in muscles, bones, and joints

numbness, pain,

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decreased appetite

in your hands or feet

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What should I discuss with my healthcare team before receiving OPDIVO?



Tell your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including

- have immune system problems such as Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, or lupus
- have received an organ transplant
- have received or plan to receive a stem cell transplant that uses donor stem cells (allogeneic)
- have received radiation treatment to your chest area in the past and have received other medicines that are like OPDIVO
- have a condition that affects your nervous system, such as myasthenia gravis or Guillain-Barré syndrome
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. OPDIVO can harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if OPDIVO passes into your breast milk. Do not breastfeed during treatment with OPDIVO and for 5 months after the last dose of OPDIVO.



Females who are able to become pregnant:

Your healthcare provider should do a pregnancy test before you start receiving OPDIVO.

- You should use an effective method of birth control during your treatment and for at least 5 months after the last dose of OPDIVO. Talk to your healthcare provider about birth control methods that you can use during this time.
- Tell your healthcare provider right away if you become pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with OPDIVO.



Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including:

- prescription medicines
- vitamins
- over-the-counter medicines
- herbal supplements
